We're Planning a 100th Birthday Party—for Westwood Park!

Join the new Centennial Committee or contribute memorabilia

IN A MARCH, 1921 article in the San Francisco Examiner about home sales in Westwood Park, John W. Kroeze, a 22-year city resident, said he "felt humiliated" that he had never been to Westwood Park until the prior month.

"I was amazed at what I found at Westwood Park" said Kroeze. "It really is a bungalow city all by itself, and it did not take me long to make up my mind to locate there." Kroeze was so taken with the neighborhood that he bought a home on Faxon Avenue at Wildwood, for \$7,500.

Change the date and the price of the home, and the same article could be written today. Westwood Park is almost 100 years old, and it is still not unusual for longtime San Franciscans to say, "Westwood Park? Where is it?"

The Westwood Park Association was incorporated on March 22, 1917, and board members have decided it's about time to give our 20th century bungalow neighborhood its due with a centennial celebration.

SO HOW DO YOU CELEBRATE THE 100TH BIRTHDAY OF A NEIGHBORHOOD? The answer to that question will come from the Centennial Committee being organized to plan activities for a year-long celebration in 2017.

Suggestions for the committee to consider may include: designing a centennial logo; publishing a commemorative book about Westwood Park; finding and restoring some of the original street lamps; offering public lectures about the neighborhood's history; curating a pop-up mini-museum of Westwood Park ephemera and photos; conducting home and garden tours; and placing centennial banners around the neighborhood. Undoubtedly, other suggestions will be bandied about when the new committee meets later this year.

Apartments and Stores to Replace Ocean Avenue Service Station

IN JUNE, the City Planning Commission approved the demolition of the gas station at 1490 Ocean Avenue at Miramar.

The station will be replaced with a fourstory building with 15 market-rate residential units—rentals or condos—as well as retail space on the ground floor and off-street parking.

One of Westwood Park's historic entrance pillars is located on this property. We are pleased that the owner agreed to retain the pillar for the life of the building, and that the plans provide for a setback to protect the pillar and improve its visibility. The Planning Commission made retention of the pillar a formal condition of approval.

In addition, the Planning Commission included a formal condition that there must be one parking space provided for each unit. This will help to mitigate the parking and traffic problems that Westwood Park residents currently face.

Meanwhile, the board is putting out the call to all residents, asking everyone to dig through boxes of old photos of family life in the neighborhood. Westwood Park is a significant housing tract built in the early 1900s as a "residence park." It was designed to give city residents the opportunity to escape the noise, pollution and crowded conditions of downtown, and to live in a country-like setting. Most residence parks—such as St. Francis Wood, Presidio Terrace and Forest Hills—were built for the upper class. But Westwood Park has the distinction of being built for middle-class San Franciscans.

A Fond Farewell . . .

Dear Neighbors,

Just a note to say it's been a pleasure editing the neighborhood newsletter and sharing local news and stories with you for eight years, since my first issue in March, 2005.

In addition to bringing you the annual ballot for voting for our neighborhood's volunteer leaders, Halloween Contest winners, financial information and updates about



zoning, safety and our common areas, it's been fun telling stories about Westwood Park history and other "Perks of the Park."

I hope you'll indulge me as I think back on a few of my favorites, all still available on our website, *WestwoodPark.com*. I especially enjoyed writing the following stories, and hope you enjoyed reading them:



- "Hans Nelson: A Founding Father of Westwood Park" about Hans Nelson, an early 20th century contractor who built 350 of the Park's 650 homes. (Dec., 2005).
- "Limerick Laureate of Westwood Park," in which neighbor Alex Davis won our limerick contest—and earned an original Herb Caen manuscript typed by the late columnist himself. (Sept. 2006)

Here is a reprint of Mr. Davis' immortal poem:

The bungalows of Westwood do rock;

Take one hundred Hazelwood block,

Where Craftsman details,

And few garden snails

Make bird life prevail by the flock.

"Meet Neighbors Art & Dorothy Adams," about the first African American family in the Park, who had to break into their own new home in 1959 after the seller learned she had sold to a black family. The Adams family are still proud homeowners in Westwood Park. (Dec., 2006) ◆ "From Iguazu Falls to Westwood Park," about our beloved Melanio Duarte and how he came to own and operate Caffe d'Melanio on Ocean Ave. at Plymouth. We greatly miss Melanio, who died suddenly in spring 2011, one-anda-half years after the story appeared. (Dec. 2009)

- "Miramar's Modest Matron," about the mysterious Deodara cedar tree at the center of the Miramar Circle. (Spring, 2010)
- ◆ "The Westwood Park Tribune," about this community's first neighborhood newsletter, written and edited by the Zadra sisters in 1956, who ranged in age from 9 to 13. The article includes a reprint of one of those early newsletters. (Sept. 2010)
- "The Miramar Median: What's With the Trees?" about

the dozens of trees that grace the Miramar median, and the fate of its many marvelous stone pines. (Spring, 2012)

There have been many other stories written by talented volunteer writers, especially our Westwood Park Association board members who have generously donated their time to making the newsletter informative and entertaining for our neighborhood. This property is part of the Ocean Avenue commercial corridor and therefore is not subject to the Westwood Park Association's Residential Design Guidelines or our Residential Character District boundaries. But the Association requested that heightened sensitivity be given to the project because it is located at the entrance to our community.

The proposed building plan incorporates architectural elements of classic 1920s bungalows, including exposed exterior beams, roof overhangs, wood trim and moldings, wood (or wood-like) framed windows, balconies, terra cotta roof tile accents and earthtone colors. The Planning Commission was pleased that these elements were incorporated into the plan.

Man's Best Friend In and Around Westwood Park

THE FOLLOWING are the San Francisco laws that govern safe and healthy dog ownership in our residential neighborhoods.

- ◆ Leash Law: It is illegal to allow your dog to roam off your premises without a leash, except in areas designated as an animal exercise area[San Francisco Health Code Sec. 41(a) and 41.12(a)]. There
 - are several off leash dog running locations in San Francisco, which can be found on line at *www.sfgov.org* (Department of Parks and Recreation), or by telephone at 415-831-2700.
- ◆ Cleaning Up After your Dog: It is illegal to allow your dog to defecate on any public or private property (other than your own) without immediately removing and disposing of the dog's feces [San Francisco Health Code Section 40(a)]. Further, it is illegal to walk your dog anywhere off your property without carrying a suitable container/instrument for removing and disposing of the dog's feces [San Francisco Health Code Sec. 40(b)].

The Laptop Computer Program at the Ingleside Library Branch on Ocean Avenue

OUR INGLESIDE Branch is an active participant the San Francisco Public Library's project to help increase computer resources for use by the public. In this program, laptop and desktop computers can be borrowed by library card holders for up to an hour daily. These laptops can print to the branch public print station or multifunctional device.

- ◆ Laptops can be borrowed for in-library use only
- ◆ Laptops can be borrowed for up to one hour
- No laptops can be borrowed 30 minutes prior to the library closing
- ◆ There are no DVD/CD drives on the laptops
- You must use a personal USB device to save your work
- All files and downloads will be deleted when your session has been completed
