The Westwood Park Tribune

If the distant past has anything going for it, it's that you could get more for your money than you can today – including news of Westwood Park.

In 1956, neighbors not only received a hand-delivered, postage-free monthly newsletter, but the paper offered feature articles, editorial commentary, entertainment and even ads.

You got your Top Ten Tunes. Original poetry. Advice on everything from kite flying to income tax. And you got a few laughs. Best of all, you could find out when the Girl Scouts were coming by with cookies.

Unlike today's pricey rag – which relies on design software, a professional printer and the postal service – the newsletter of 1956 was a bargain at the cost of its paper and ink from the mimeograph. Even its name was better: "The Westwood Park Tribune."

A staff of 5 wrote and edited stories each month, but only after finishing their homework. They attended Sunnyside Elementary, Commodore Sloat, and Aptos.

"We were trying to find something to do, and somebody came up with the newspaper idea," said Ingrid Larson, a lawyer who runs the Downieville Grocery Store in Sierra County. (The story of the Tribune's founding appeared in its March, 1956 issue, reprinted on Page 4 of this newsletter.)

Larson (then called Carolyn) and her sisters Nancy and Rhoda grew up in the old Chronicle house on the Miramar Circle. They were 9 to 13 years old when they created the Tribune with their friends, Carolyn Relei and Hope Johnson.

"My mother had an Underwood upright typewriter and my father

In 1949, the Larsons bought the house that had been offered as a prize by the San Francisco Chronicle a quarter century earlier. Prof. Edward Larson, a survivor of the 1906 earthquake, taught business at City College. He became president of the Westwood Park Association and chose the

had a mimeograph machine in the basement that he used to prepare his exams for his classes at City College," Nancy Larson Zadra wrote in an email from her home in Montana. "We used this equipment to cut and run the stencil for our publication."

Deodara cedar tree for the Miramar Circle, wrote Zadra, an artist and retired art teacher.

Rhoda Larson became director of foreign studies at Pomona College in Claremont, CA., where she is today. Carolyn Relei is a stained-glass artist in Palm Desert. Hope Johnson's whereabouts were not immediately known.

"Now we're busy having grandchildren," Ingrid Larson said with a laugh.

The Westwood Park Tribune published monthly for a year before going out of business.

"It was fun," Ingrid Larson recalled. "It was a ball. I guess we outgrew it."

Open to all residents, Westwood Park NERT meetings are led by trained volunteers from the neighborhood. We typically meet on the fourth Wednesday of each month in homes, cafes, and, increasingly, in the Activities Room of the new Ingleside Library, 1298 Ocean Ave. at Plymouth.

"The room is the closest thing we have to a regular home," said Greg Morris, a longtime volunteer.
